## MEETING OF PARISHIONERS AND ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING

The Annual Church Meetings will be held on Sunday 22 April 2012 at 6:00 pm in St Chad's. It is an opportunity for all parishioners to contribute to and be involved in the affairs of the Parish. Please come and give your support. The meeting will be followed by a short service for those who wish to stay.

We shall receive reports on the matters discussed by the Parochial Church Council, the financial affairs of the Church, the Deanery Synod and the associated Organisations. We shall also:

- discuss the independently inspected accounts of the PCC for the year ended 31 December 2011
- elect Church Wardens, who must be nominated and seconded in writing before the meeting (Churchwarden's Measure 2001)
- elect members of the Parochial Church Council
- appoint Sidespersons for the year
- receive a report on the Electoral Roll
- discuss any topics raised by parishioners.

Sidespersons' names are displayed in the churches on the duty rotas. If you wish to bring any topics forward for discussion, please notify the Rector or Secretary in advance of the meeting.

The Parochial Church Council currently comprises the Rector (Revd J Turner), the Churchwardens (Mr R Jackson and Mr J Roberts), the representatives to the Deanery Synod (Mr M Studholme, Mrs H Boothman and Mr C Smale, with one vacancy), all as *ex-officio* members, Mrs J Abbott, co-opted in 2010, and the following elected representatives of the congregation:

- Mr J Oliver, Mrs J DeBoorder and Dr E Norton-Jones, elected until 2012
- Mrs K Robson, Dr M James, Mrs S Lang, Mrs E Jones and Mr C Eden, elected until 2013.
- Mr A Whelen, Mr E Jones, Mr G Barley, Mrs B Appleyard and Mr C Vickers, elected until 2014.

Mr J Oliver, Mrs J DeBoorder and Dr E Norton-Jones retire from office this year but may be re-elected for a further three years. There are two further vacancies for election until 2015.

This means that there are five vacancies for elected members of the PCC, with three currently elected members available for re-election and one vacancy for a Deanery Synod representative until 2014, who will be ex-officio a member of the PCC. Mrs Abbott, who is currently a co-opted member of the PCC, may be elected to any of those vacancies.

Nominations for churchwardens must be received in writing in the proper form by the Rector before the meeting and may not be made after the meeting has begun.

Lists for nominations of Wardens, Sidespersons and members of the Council will be posted at the two churches. Please enter the names of nominees and sponsors. Any other members wishing to retire are asked to inform the Secretary well before the meeting.

### **Minutes of Previous Meeting**

Mrs M McKie seconded by Mrs J Ratcliffe proposed acceptance of the minutes of the previous meeting on 28<sup>th</sup> April 2010 and published in the March edition of the Church magazine. The proposal was agreed unanimously.

#### **Election of Churchwardens**

Mr R Jackson (first elected 26<sup>th</sup> April 2009) and Mr J Roberts (first elected 18<sup>th</sup> April 2010) had been nominated and seconded, and had signed to say they agreed to the nomination and were not disqualified. As no further nominations had been received prior to the meeting, Mr Jackson and Mr Roberts were declared elected.

The Meeting of Parishioners closed.

#### ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING

#### Minutes of Previous Meeting

Mr G Burns seconded by Mrs L Ormsby proposed acceptance of the minutes of the previous meeting on  $28^{th}$  April 2010 and published in the March edition of the Church magazine. The proposal was agreed unanimously.

#### **Approval of Reports**

The Rector referred to formal reports published in the Annual Report and, for each one in turn, asked if there were any questions. Mrs C Rostock, seconded by Mrs M McKie, proposed acceptance of the following reports published in the Annual Report:

The Business of the Church Council during 2010

The Electoral Roll

The Sunday School

The St Chad's Seniors

The proposal was agreed unanimously.

### **Approval of Reports on Parish Organisations**

Mrs L Ormsby, seconded by Mr J Oliver, proposed acceptance of the reports from the Mothers' Union, the Evening Mothers' Union and other parish organisations, all published in the Annual Report. The proposal was agreed unanimously.

### Report on the Financial Affairs of the Church

Mr C Eden, the Honorary Treasurer, presented and amplified on the report and accounts published in the Annual Report. He said that reserves were very low and that if losses continued at the present rate, the Church would have no funds remaining by mid-2012.

He emphasised that the Church gave no financial support to organisations such as the Playgroup. He was concerned that, at just under £7, the average weekly amount given to the Church by parishioners was considerably less than the average for the Diocese three years ago (more than £10). The Rector thanked him for his work on the accounts and for his work throughout the year.

### Approval of the Independently Inspected Annual Accounts for 2010

Mrs S Burns, seconded by Mrs E Jones and Mr C Jones, proposed approval and acceptance of the independently inspected Church accounts for 2010 and the proposal was agreed unanimously. On behalf of the meeting, the Rector thanked Mr Turner for his work on the accounts for 2010.

Two questions were raised by members of the congregations. Mrs H Boothman asked if it would be possible to ask for a contribution to the Church at events such as funerals and christenings. This was referred to the Church Council (PCC). Mrs S Burns asked if we could reduce our Parish Share, currently £1,000 a week. The Rector stated that the Diocese was about to consult parishes on the Parish Share system.

### Appointment of an Independent Examiner of the Accounts for 2011

Mr J Oliver, seconded by Mr M Studholme, proposed inviting Mr R Turner if he would examine the accounts for 2011. The proposal was agreed unanimously.

### Report on the Proceedings of the Deanery Synod

Mr M Studholme reported on the proceedings of the meetings of the Deanery Synod during 2010. The Rector thanked him for his report.

### **Election of Deanery Synod Representatives to serve until 2014**

The following members of the congregations were elected unopposed:

Mr M Studholme, sponsored by Mr E Bezant and Mrs L Roberts

Mrs H Boothman, sponsored by Dr E Norton-Jones and Mrs J DeBoorder

Mr C Smale, sponsored by Mrs M McKie and Mrs S Turnbull

One vacancy was unfilled.

#### **Election of Members of the Parochial Church Council**

Five members elected in 2008 had come to the ends of their terms of office, creating vacancies until 2014. In addition, there were three casual vacancies until 2012 and one until 2013. The seven members of the congregations listed below were elected. They had all previously confirmed their willingness to stand:

Two casual vacancies were unfilled.

The Rector thanked Mr Bezant, who was retiring after 21 years service as Honorary Treasurer and at least another 16 years service on the PCC. She presented him with a gift from the PCC. She also thanked Mr D Wolstencroft and Mr A Tempest, who had retired during the year.

### **Appointment of Sidespersons**

By unanimous agreement, the currently serving sidespersons were reappointed and Mr G Burns was appointed.

#### Other Business

There was no other business

#### **Rector's Remarks**

The Rector thanked all who had supported her in her ministry. There were too many to name individually but she picked out the members of the Standing Committee and David and Ian, who had accepted responsibility for the 8.00am services. She said she had recently attended a conference at Scargill House, Yorkshire, entitled "Leaders learning to listen". She said it had been extremely valuable personally and for our ministry together in Irby and Thurstaston. She had also recognised God's will through prayer that she should focus more on "basics" through a prayer group, to discern where God is at work in the parish, and that growth would follow. The prayer group would commence in May 2011. She read a passage from Acts 2: 42-47 and focused on the sentence, "They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers", concluding that, "at the centre of any growing church is prayer".

### Closing Remarks by Mr R Jackson

Mr Jackson thanked the Rector for all she was doing for the parish, for her organisation, faith and positive approach.

The meeting closed at 7.05pm and was followed by a service of Compline.

## **CHURCH ELECTORAL ROLL - 2012 REVISION**

This year the roll will be subject to the usual annual review. Current members will automatically remain on the roll and new members can be added until the end of March. Members are reminded that to be a member of the role a person's main place of residence must be within the parish or they must be a regular attendee at worship. Only members of the roll will be entitled to vote at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting, which will be held on 22nd April 2012, and be elected to hold office in the parish and/or deanery.

We ask existing members to check their entry, correct any errors and/or update their address.

The roll is the official record of all those who are members of our churches and reflects the depth and strength of our parish. Anyone aged 16 years or older who is baptized and is a member of the Church of England, (or a church in communion with the Church of England) and lives within the parish boundary, or lives outside the parish boundary but is a habitual attendee at our services is entitled to be a member of the roll. We, therefore, strongly encourage all those who regularly attend our churches to become members of the roll.

## **Thinking Day 2012**

The girl guiding website sums up thinking day pretty well:-

'World Thinking Day, is an annual event when 10 million Guides around the world in 145 countries think of each other, of the world they live in, of all that makes them different and all that makes them the same. This happens on the same day each year.

'It is a day when they come together in thought to celebrate the opportunities that guiding offers them whether they are in a rural community in Africa, in the Australian outback or in the busy streets of Aberdeen. Not only do girls in guiding have a better future because they belong, their communities benefit too. '

World Thinking day was created in 1926 when it was agreed that there should be a special day when girl guides and girl scouts around the world think of each other and give thanks for the international friendship they find in the guiding/scouting movement. The 22<sup>nd</sup> February was chosen as this is the mutal birthday of Lord Baden Powell (founded boy scout movement) and his wife Olave (who was world chief guide).

The theme for Thinking Day this year was "we can save our planet" with the aim to raise awareness of the environment and the impacts our lifestyles and choices have on it.

As a district (Irby and Thurstaston) we held a special evening for Thinking Day, on  $22^{nd}$  February. This involved about 20 rainbows (from  $1^{st}$  and  $2^{nd}$  Irby rainbow units), 40 brownies (from  $2^{nd}$  and 3rd Irby brownie units) and 40 guides (from  $2^{nd}$  Irby and  $1^{st}$  Thurstaston guide units) all meeting at the Methodist Church in Irby.

There was a special ceremony in the middle of the evening where all the girls got together, and a promise ceremony was held for some of the new rainbows, brownies and guides, where they made their promises for the first time in front of everyone.

Many different events/games and challenges were arranged for the evening, all around the theme of saving the planet. As there are such a range of ages when rainbows (5-7), brownies (7-10) and guides (10-14) get together, special activities were tailored to each section. For the guides, these included making origami birds using recycled paper, creating a poster to encourage people to save electricity, making a pinwheel turbine and others. All the girls from all the units were asked to write one thing that would help to save the environment on a foot shaped piece of paper (to symbolise the environmental footprint) and these were collected in and put on one huge poster, creating a huge visual display of ideas to help save the planet!

All the girls had a wonderful evening, and it was nice to have all the different units from the district together in one place celebrating this special day.

### Diamond Jubilee: Elizabeth - pt 3. 'To love and to cherish'

In 2011 the marriage of Prince William to Catherine Middleton was the celebrity event of the year - and not just in Britain. The world-wide television audience for the wedding in St Paul's cathedral was numbered in hundreds of millions and the media coverage bordered on the hysterical. It may be hard for people under seventy to believe, but the engagement and later the marriage of Princess Elizabeth to Lieut. Philip Mountbatten attracted a similar level of public interest 65 years ago, though the celebrity scene was somewhat more restrained in those days.

People had known for some time that love was in the air. The dark and petite princess was often to be seen with her tall and fair-haired escort. Speculation in the popular press was rife. Was the heir to the throne about to be engaged to this handsome young naval officer, despite his Greek and Danish family background - and even family connections with Germany?

Eventually the engagement was announced, to be followed by the information that Philip would renounce his Greek and Danish titles. Indeed, when they married he even gave up his family name, Mountbatten, though not without regret. 'Am I the only married man', he asked, 'whose children will not bear his name?' He became Philip Windsor - a more reassuringly British surname than his foreign-sounding family name, I suppose.

The wedding was eagerly anticipated. Britain was in the middle of long years of post-war austerity. Food was still strictly rationed, and the first months of 1947 saw a cruelly cold Winter, when the temperature refused to climb above freezing for weeks on end and coal was in short supply because trucks full of it were stuck in ice-locked sidings. People were wondering - if this was how it was for the victors, how were the vanquished faring? (The answer was, about the same, as it happens.)

So the prospect of a glamorous and splendid public occasion lifted the spirits. Thousands of people camped out on the streets of London on a damp November day to watch the royal carriages sweep past on their way to Westminster Abbey, a to catch a glimpse of the bride, and then the married couple on their way back. Even in black and white photographs one could see how happy they were and the depth of their love for each other. This marriage, at least, was certainly made in heaven.

There was more public rejoicing the following year when their first child, Charles, was born, to be followed by Anne in 1950, Andrew in 1960 and Edward in 1964. The House of Windsor was truly in business again!





## April Recipe - Fruity Chicken

This recipe was given to me by someone at St Chad's, but it did not have a name on it. Anyway I would like to thank the person who left it for me, it is very tasty.

Serves 4 - I made it for just the two of us and found it made enough to warm through the second day, the portions are very generous.

**INGREDIENTS** 450g/1lb chicken breast,

Small amount of sunflower oil chopped

175g/6oz sliced leeks 175g/6oz sliced mushrooms

1 red pepper 175g/6oz eating apples, sliced

25g/1oz plain flour 4 tbsp Mango chutney

275ml/½ pint chicken stock Black pepper

### Method

1. Prepare vegetables

- 2. Cut up chicken breast
- 3. Heat small amount of oil in pan and fry the leek and red pepper for 4/5 mins.
- 4. Make up stock.
- 5. Stir flour into vegetable mixture and work well in to create a roux and cook for approx 1 minute.
- 6. Slowly add the warm stock mixing well with a wooden spoon.
- 7. Add the remaining ingredients.
- 8. Add black pepper to taste.
- Cover and cook for approx. 45 mins. making sure the chicken is cooked through.

Serve with new potatoes and green veg of choice.

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
### **Letter to God**
