

Christian Aid Week, 12-18 May 2013



Today around 870 million people are desperate for food. One in eight people will go to bed hungry tonight. This is a scandal.

But IF we bite back at hunger this Christian Aid Week we can help communities find ways to not only survive but to thrive, with enough food to eat not just today but tomorrow.

Looking at the Church

Martin Saunders, a youth ministry specialist, this month meets Lola, to hear her story of how she found faith in God.

TEEN meets GOD: Lola's story

I came from a family in which no-one knew or wanted to know Jesus. One day my friend invited me to the local youth club at my Salvation Army. I hadn't been involved in a church before so I was a bit cautious. To be honest, at the time I was also a bit of a hand full! But I got to know and love the people there as they shared their lives - and many pizza nights - with me. They impacted me as they seemed quite normal, and yet they were so different.

Slowly they started to invite me to Christian events and I started one-to-one mentoring, which really helped me at a troubling time in my life. Meeting with a female youth worker for an hour a week to unpack my struggles, learn more about the bible and learning to pray together was amazing. That relationship with my youth workers gave me the confidence to go that summer to the Soul Survivor festival and there I gave my life to Jesus.

Back at church we got a new youth worker, and we started exploring Jesus in a fresh, different way. I was starting to think about university options, and she introduced me to a load of her friends who were doing creative and quirky things in the name of Jesus in her home town, a town that also had the perfect university course for me! They bake cupcakes for brothels and gay bars; they open the local church on a Saturday night until 4am and fill it with thought provoking art installations. They go clubbing together as a distinct act of worship and lavish love, building relationships with the night-time community.

Since moving there I have got involved and started taking my faith to a new level, I am hungry for Jesus and want to know more of him. Through my new church and the community I live in, I am sure that I will only continue to learn and love more!

Lola is 19 and lives in Bournemouth.

Lola made a decision to follow Jesus. She prayed, asking God to forgive her for the things she does wrong, and then she promised to live God's way.

WHATIF THE CHURCH SAW BLOOD AND ORGAN DONATION AS PART OF ITS GIVING?

Looking at You - daily life in the 21st century

Why a cluttered desk could mess up your whole life

Never mind hard work and perseverance: have you tidied your desk lately? A clear desk will help free your internal world, and make you more successful. So says an expert, who warns that "clutter in your outer environment is the physical manifestation of all the clutter that is going on inside of you. Clearing clutter has a ripple effect across your entire life, including your work."

Jayne Morris is the resident life coach for NHS online, and she goes on to warn that "the things you are holding on to that you don't really like, don't ever use, and don't need any more.... things that no longer fit or serve you, drain your energy." Scans have confirmed that victims of hoarding disorder have abnormal activity in regions of the brain involved in decision making. A survey has shown that more than a million people in the UK are compulsive about keeping their possessions. But Ecclesiastes observes: "There is a time to keep, and a time to cast away..." (Ecc 3:6)

How money CAN buy you happiness

Money may not buy you love, but if you spend it on gifts for other people, it seems that it can buy you some happiness. A recent global survey of more than 235,000 people has found that whether you are rich or poor, if you spend money on other people, you will be happier than if you spend it on yourself.

From poor Ugandans to wealthy Canadians, it seems that those of us who treat our friends and family experience a 'warm glow', according to the Gallup poll. As one Canadian professor said, the study showed that helping others is "deeply ingrained in human nature." And no wonder: "It is more blessed to give than to receive." (Acts 20:35)

Daydreaming is good for you

Daydreaming is not a waste of time; periods of quiet introspection can help boost concentration, memory and moral judgment. This is because inward focus impacts the way we build memories, make meaning and transfer that learning into new contexts. Research at the University of California has found that periods of quiet reflection help us to become more motivated, less anxious, perform better, and plan more effectively. "But our fast paced urban and digital environment could be undermining the chances of reflection." Psalm 46:10 urges us to slow down, "be still, and know that I am God."

Looking at your Community

This study, although not at all Christian-based, found some interesting evidence....

Humans are predisposed to believe in God

Humans are predisposed to believe in God and in some sort of life after death, according to the recent findings of a three-year international study.

Religion is "not just something for a peculiar few to do on Sunday instead of playing golf," says co-director of the project, Prof Roger Trigg, from the University of Oxford. In a study that involved 57 academics in 20 countries across multiple disciplines, "we have gathered a body of evidence that suggests that religion is a common fact of human nature across different societies."

The study found that human thought processes, from infancy, are "rooted" to religious concepts. But people living in cities in developed countries are less likely to hold religious beliefs than those living a more rural way of life. Nevertheless, the findings suggest that "attempts to suppress religion are likely to be short-lived, as human thought seems to be rooted to religious concepts such as the existence of supernatural agents or gods, and the possibility of an afterlife or pre-life."

Why you should snoop on your child

What is your child doing on the internet and who – and what – are they texting? Parents should 'snoop' on their child's texts and social media messages, says David Cameron's new adviser on childhood, Claire Perry, MP.

Mrs Perry, who has three children, finds it 'bizarre' that parents regard their children's internet and texting activity as 'private', when the dangers of going online are so well documented. Would they leave their children alone for hours on end in a roomful of total strangers, and consider it no concern of theirs, as the parents? Society has become 'complicit', she says, in allowing a culture where young people can have inappropriate contact with strangers 24 hours a day.

The trend of children 'sexting' each other – sending explicit images of their bodies to other children on their phones, is "absolutely horrific", yet is "happening in pretty much every school in the country." Mrs Perry has called on parents to take responsibility and challenge their children about their use of technology and the internet. She suggested that parents turn off the internet when they go to bed to prevent youngsters being online with who-knows-who until the early hours.

Mrs Perry says she is prepared to be branded as 'the Mary Whitehouse' of this decade. "When I am finished I want Britain to be absolutely leading the world in online child safety."

The PCC is responsible for cooperating with the incumbent, in promoting the mission of the church in Thurstaston and Irby - evangelistic, pastoral, ecumenical and social - and for supporting it by maintaining St Bartholomew's, St Chad's, the churchyard and other grounds. It is also responsible for the financial affairs of the church, the care of the fabric of the church and its goods and ornaments, and the care of the churchyard. The latter responsibilities are executed by the churchwardens. The PCC has ultimate responsibility for many other matters affecting the parish, including compliance with health and safety, disability discrimination and child protection legislation. In all these matters, the PCC seeks guidance from the Diocese, and that guidance forms the basis of the PCC's policies. The Diocese and sometimes the Deanery also provide suitable training and information concerning these matters. The PCC has a voice in the forms of Service used by the church and may make representations to the bishop on matters affecting the welfare of the parish.

Its other powers include acquiring property, framing a budget and (in theory) levying a church rate.



May Recipe - CHICKEN CURRY

INGREDIENTS 1 tbls curry powder

450gm (11b) boneless chicken, 1 tbls flour

diced 300ml ($\frac{1}{2}$ pint) chicken stock

1 small onion, chopped from a cube

1 apple, cooking or dessert apple 1 tbls mango chutney - generous

1 tbls cooking oil measure

METHOD

1. Heat oil in a pan and cook onion until soft but without burning.

2. Add the meat and brown all over.

3. Stir in the curry powder and flour and cook for a few minutes.

4. Add the apple, chutney and stock and bring to the boil, lower heat and simmer until meat is tender, approx. 30/40 mins.

Serve with cooked rice. I also slice ½ a banana each.

I have used this recipe with leftover turkey or cooked chicken and it is just as nice.

Serves two generous portions or four small portions.




