

From your rector

Dear Friends,

As we approach the Summer and many of you look forward to a holiday, the next page has a small puzzle to while away a few moments!

On 3rd July the Church remembers St Thomas, also called Doubting Thomas, because he would not believe his fellow disciples' news of the But 'doubt' did not mean that Thomas did not love Resurrection. Only a few weeks before, Thomas had urged his fellow disciples to follow Jesus to see Lazarus in Bethany, despite danger from the Jews. "Let us also go, that we may die with him." (John Instead, Jesus brought Lazarus back to life. Thomas was sometimes very confused about just where Jesus was headed. But in John 14:5 Jesus untangled his confused commitment: "I am going to my father", and "No one comes unto the Father but by me." after the Resurrection, Jesus appeared to Thomas, showing him the wounds of his crucifixion. Thomas was electrified, and his response immediate: "My Lord and my God" (John 20.26ff). Thus Doubting Thomas' honest doubts, turned to honest faith, have become a reassurance for thousands of people down the centuries.



I hope and pray that you will all have a good Summer.

Throughout May/June we conducted a hymn survey at both churches and thought you might like to see the results.

Thank you to everyone who took part, it will be really helpful for those of us who plan worship. It was also very enlightening as to why sometimes you tell us that you didn't know the hymns that had been chosen for a service.

At St Bartholomew's there were only 30 hymns that every person who completed a questionnaire knew! There were a further 70 hymns that were known by at least two thirds or respondents. There were another 70 hymns known by between one third and two thirds of respondents. There were a further 170 hymns known by less than one third of respondents. And a further 100 hymns which only one respondent knew. So as a group of individuals we know a total of 440 hymns, but the collective group knowledge is as you have seen MUCH smaller than that which if we assume to be representative of the congregation as a whole means only 100 hymns known by two thirds or more of the congregation.

At St Chad's the picture was similar. There were only 30 hymns that every person who completed a questionnaire knew! There were a further 85 hymns that were known by at least two thirds or respondents. There were another 85 hymns known by between one third and two thirds of respondents. There were a further 270 hymns known by less than one third of respondents. And a further 110 hymns which only one respondent knew. So as a group of individuals we know a total of 580 hymns, but the collective group knowledge is as you have seen MUCH smaller than that, which if we assume to be representative of the congregation as a whole means only 115 hymns known by two thirds or more of the congregation.

And as might have been expected and can be seen by the top ten lists, the hymns known by each congregation are very different!

None of the figures above include Christmas Carols which were taken out and counted separately.

Also interesting was that there were some top ten choices which were virtually unknown by others in the congregation. So for instance at St Bartholomew's there were three hymns which were chosen by an individual as in their top ten, but they were the only person that indicated that they knew the hymn. Those hymns were "All I once held dear", "At even ere the sun was set" and "Restore O Lord". There was only one such hymn at St Chad's which was "Spirit of God (Mallaig sprinkling song)", but there were several where only two or three other people knew the hymn such as "Your love's greater", "Put thou thy trust in God", "Led like a lamb (you're alive)", "God's spirit is in my heart (go tell everyone)" and "Come and celebrate".

In total there were 20 hymns chosen by an individual at St Bartholomew's as in their top ten, which are known by less than one third of the congregation.

In total there were 27 hymns chosen by an individual at St Chad's as in their top ten, which are known by less than one third of the congregation.

I am hoping that next term we may be able to find a way of increasing our communal knowledge of hymns and enjoy discovering together the hymns that other people like that we may not have come across before.

I am also planning a couple of special services in which we can enjoy praising God together with our communal top ten hymns:-


Parting Shot—How our God works in mysterious ways.

The Cobweb Picture

As a child I was taken by my Uncle who lived in Chester to see the Cobweb Picture in Chester Cathedral. I remember being fascinated by the idea that it could be painted on a spider's web.

The picture is that of the Madonna and Child and there is a light shining through from the back that lights up the two faces which are really beautiful. The picture has been on display in various locations in the Cathedral and is now displayed in the north transept in a niche or small shrine.

When our children were old enough to appreciate it, I took them to see the picture and had at that time no answer to the question 'HOW?'

The art of painting on webs appears to have started with Ellias Prunner, a copper engraver from south Tyrol, who lived in the 18th century. Another artist Johann Burgman also painted on webs and thought to be a pupil of Prunner, is assumed to have painted the picture in the Chester Cathedral. It is entitled 'Our Lady and the Holy Child Jesus'. The picture comes from the Tyrol and is painted on the net of a caterpillar Hyponomeuta Evanymella L. It is a copy of a picture by Lucas Cranach 1 (1472-1553) now in the Church of St Jacob, Innsbruck.

Two forms of web were used to make cobweb pictures, those of a spider and those done on the silky web of a caterpillar of a small silvery-white moth, found in great numbers in the mountains of the south Tyrol. The web forms

a veil covering the trunks of fruit trees, particularly Prunus. Despite its fine texture it is remarkably strong and not as easily torn as a spider's web, enabling it to be unwound from the trees and spread on frames for painting. There were different ways of producing the pictures and it is really interesting.

The picture in Chester Cathedral is about 200 yrs old and was presented to the Cathedral in the late nineteenth century. I am told that it is the only one in the U.K.

I think it is well worth a visit. Betty Rimmer

SOUP OF THE MONTH

Creamy Mushroom soup with Spring Onions

(serves 4—starter)

60g butter or margarine

250g finely chopped mushrooms

5 spring onions, chopped

25ml flour

300ml milk

300ml vegetable stock (or chicken)

75g creamed cottage cheese or crème fraiche

5ml lemon juice

Salt and ground black pepper

25ml chopped chives for decoration

Melt 30g butter in large frying pan. Sauté mushrooms and spring onions for about 5 minutes until soft. Set to one side.

Melt remaining butter in large saucepan, stir in flour and cook for one minute. Gradually add milk and stock, stirring continuously until mixture boils and thickens.

Add cottage cheese or crème fraiche, mushroom mixture, lemon juice and seasoning. Stir over low heat until heated through.

Just before serving sprinkle with chopped chives.

Serve with hot crusty bread.

REFURBISHMENT OF ST CHAD'S HALL KITCHEN

Anyone who has used the kitchen at St Chad's recently will know that it is in urgent need of refurbishment. In particular many of the kitchen units are barely serviceable. The church has obtained a small grant from Wirral Council but this only covers about 12% of the estimated cost of full refurbishment. The estimated total cost of the project is about £10,000. We just do not have sufficient general church funds to be able to contribute to the cost. We may only be able to partly do the work but even to cover the basic costs we need to raise a lot more money as soon as possible because the work needs to take place this August during the summer building closure.

The church would therefore be very grateful for any contributions to this project and any donation however small would be gratefully received and will be acknowledged. Please could you send any contributions clearly labelled for St Chad's kitchen refurbishment to the parish office indicating whether the contribution can be considered as gift aided. SPIRITUALITY THROUGH TEXTILES



St Chads Church Irby

These sessions will offer the basic techniques of felt making which can then be used both practically and spiritually.

Many of us find the rushing, demanding pace of life gives us little breathing space. A time to think and consider without distraction is precious. It will be chance to give time to the things on our mind. Arts and crafts can heal and give hope to our often weary souls ."The body is naturally restless, if you give it a focused activity, it settles down, calming the mind as well" (Anthony Bloom)

Textile memory is important, the touch and feel of fibres and fabric can be calming and soothing. Soft blankets used to wrap and swaddle give comfort and security. The feel of a fabric can be as evocative as smell and taste. Felt making uses soft fibres and repetitive movements to create soft beautiful fabrics. The process while busying your hands allows your mind a quiet time for contemplation and allows a freedom of thought sometimes absent from still silence. Prayer does not need the right words or indeed any words - it needs time. Felt making draws me toward that silence where God can speak to me.

Session One

We will make flat felt pieces using a rainbow of colours. While we work we will hold in our minds the promise and hope that a rainbow represents. The sight of a rainbow lifts your heart.

Session Two

We will make more flat felt to improve our technique so that our concentration moves away from the process. We will look at the work of artists such as Anneke Kaai and Vater Unser as inspiration.

Session Three

We will make 3D felt vessels to fill with lavender .These comforters are lovely to handle and as you do they release their relaxing fragrance with the warmth from your hand. They are good stress relievers in themselves.

Session Four

A journal cover for a special book in which to keep names, images, mementoes and jottings of and for your prayer journey.

Session Five

Making felt cords and beads, which can be knotted and beaded to use as a marker for the hands during prayer.

Session Six

Making a panel which incorporates pockets. These pockets can hold the names of people you are holding in prayer or topics you want to talk over with God; so they are there ready for you when you find a quiet moment.

Sessions Seven

& Eight

Felting prayers. Making pieces that are a prayer in themselves. You might make a piece for a person, holding them in your thoughts as you work the piece. Alternatively you can make a piece that is a prayer in itself. Revisiting the piece will revisit the prayer. By the last session I hope the technique will have become familiar allowing more thinking space

No explanations of anything you do will be asked for; sharing of your thoughts is not required.

This a space for YOU – hopefully a safe comfortable space
