

From Your Rector

Dear Friends,

Immediately after His baptism in the river Jordan, Jesus faced and resisted three powerful temptations during 40 days in the wilderness of Judaea. This time of testing and temptation was His preparation for the work God had sent Him to do on earth. It's the principle behind the season of Lent, which begins on 1st March. Although the temptations were personal to Jesus, I suspect most of us will recognize their relevance in our own lives.

The first was simple. 'You're hungry. You can do miracles. Well, turn these hot stones at your feet into loaves of bread'. It sounds quite plausible, but in fact it's an invitation to put one's own needs first. Temptation rejected.

Then came the second: 'throw yourself off a pinnacle of the Temple. You know that God will send His angels to catch you before you hit the ground'. Again, it's plausible (there was even a verse from the Bible to back it up). But this would be to substitute one spectacular stroke for the hard slog of travel, preaching, healing and touching individual lives. Temptation rejected.

The third was outrageous. 'Fall down and worship corrupt and evil power, and you will have infinite worldly power and success'. In other words, abandon your principles and reap rewards. For the third time, temptation resisted.

I know these temptations were tests of the Messiah Jesus, but can't we see in them temptations that come to all of us from time to time?

- Look after number one, and all will be well.
- Take the short cut to success and avoid all the hard slog.
- Compromise, in order to fulfil your ambitions.

Or walk the narrow path of honesty, commitment and truth. That's really the Lenten choice.










SHROVE TUESDAY





MEETING OF PARISHIONERS AND ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING

All parishioners are invited to these two meetings on **Sunday 30th April at St Chad's at 6.30 pm**, when members of the congregations will be appointed as churchwardens, members of the Parochial Church Council (PCC), members of the Deanery Synod and sidespersons.

The Meeting of Parishioners

The election of churchwardens is the only issue for this meeting and anyone who lives in the parish can vote. The Rector must receive nominations for churchwardens on the proper forms before the meeting begins. Nominations may not be made after the meeting has begun.

Churchwardens are elected for a year. They are legally officers of the bishop and work closely with the Rector in reporting any issues, particularly in relation to the buildings or church grounds, to her and the PCC.

The Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM)

The PCC is responsible for maintaining the churchyard, the buildings and their contents. Deanery Synod members represent the parish at Synod meetings and sidespersons (sometimes called churchwarden's assistants) help with the arrangements at services.

At the APCM, we elect and appoints members of the PCC, people to represent us at the Deanery Synod and sidespersons. We shall also receive written reports on what the PCC discussed in 2016, the church accounts and the organisations associated with the church.

PCC members are elected for three years, with five members retiring each year. This year, Janet Trigg, Julie Deboorder, Kate Preston and Graham Barley reach the ends of their terms of office but may be re-elected until 2020. There is also a vacancy, and two further vacancies for people to be members of the PCC until 2019.

At present, Malcolm Studholme and Chris Smale represent us at the Deanery Synod, and there is one vacancy. Their three-year term of office ends this year, but they can be re-elected.

That means that there will be at least four vacancies, one for the Deanery Synod and three for the PCC. We are hoping for new members who can bring fresh ideas and insights to our discussions and decisions.

Sidespersons' names are displayed in the churches on the duty rotas. Anyone who has any interest in becoming more involved in how the church arranges its activities should speak as soon as possible to the Rector, the Honorary Secretary or to any PCC member. Everyone can offer something - do not be put off just because you think you don't know enough about it.

Notices will be displayed in both churches with more details of the meetings, and with nomination forms for PCC members, deanery synod representatives and churchwardens.

Finally, if there are any matters that you wish to bring forward for discussion, please inform the Rector or the Honorary Secretary before the meeting.

Thirty-one people were present. The Rector welcomed everyone.

Apologies for Absence

Apologies were received from Mrs J Bentham, Mrs J Deboorder, Mrs J Dennison, Mr R Dennison, Dr M James, Mrs K Robson and Mr C Smale.

ANNUAL MEETING OF PARISHIONERS

Minutes of the Previous Meeting

Mr R Jackson, seconded by Mr C Turnbull, proposed acceptance of the minutes of the previous meeting on 19^{th} April 2015 and circulated in the churches and at the meeting. The proposal was agreed unanimously.

Election of Churchwardens

Mr C Perry (first elected 19th April 2015) had been nominated and seconded by Mrs K Robson and Mrs M McKie. He had signed a declaration that he agreed to the nomination, was eligible and was not disqualified. As no other nominations had been received prior to the meeting, Mr Perry was declared elected. The Rector thanked Mr Roberts for six years of valuable service as churchwarden and two years of service as treasurer and presented him with a gift, with another for Mrs Roberts. The meeting of parishioners closed.

ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING

Minutes of the Previous Meeting

Mrs M McKie, seconded by Mr C Turnbull, proposed acceptance of the minutes of the previous meeting on 19^{th} April 2015 and circulated in the churches and at the meeting. The proposal was agreed unanimously.

Approval of Reports

Mrs E Jones, seconded by Mr M Studholme, proposed acceptance of the following reports (the page numbers shown relate to the pages of the Annual Report for 2014):

- i) The Fabric, Goods and Ornaments of St Bartholomew's (pages 7 to 9)
- ii) The Fabric, Goods and Ornaments of St Chad's (pages 9 and 10)
- iii) The Business of the Church Council in 2015 (pages 3 6)
- iv) The Electoral Roll (page 11)
- v) The Junior Church (pages 13 and 14)
- vi) St Chad's Seniors (page 14)

The proposal was agreed unanimously.

Approval of Reports on Parish Organisations

Mrs K Preston, seconded by Mrs S Turnbull, proposed acceptance of the reports from the Evening Mothers' Union (EMU) and other parish organisations. The proposal was agreed unanimously.

Report on the Financial Affairs of the Parish during 2015

Mr C Williams, the Honorary Treasurer, explained that owing to unusual circumstances, a report could not be provided because the accounts for 2015 had not been completed. He thanked all those involved in the financial management of the parish, particularly Mr C Turnbull and Mrs C Rostock, for all their work during 2015.

Approval of the Independently Inspected Annual Accounts for 2015

The Treasurer explained that because the accounts for 2015 had not been completed, a further Parish Meeting would be required to approve them after they had been approved by the Independent Examiner and the PCC. He said there was no underlying problem with the accounts.

Dr P Robson asked if the financial position was stable, better or worse than at the end of 2014. The Treasurer said it was stable: the current position showed slight improvements in all respects.

Appointment of an Independent Examiner of the Accounts for 2016

A proposal by the Rector that, since it was not possible to make this appointment at the meeting, the responsibility should be delegated to the PCC, was accepted nem con.

Deanery Synod Report

The Rector explained that the Deanery Synod was part of the structure of governance of the church. Mr Studholme outlined some of benefits that membership brought, including awareness of how other parishes approached matters that we also had to deal with. A proposal by Mrs J

Trigg, seconded by Mrs K Preston, that the Report on the Proceedings of the Deanery Synod (on pages 10-11 of the Annual Report for 2015) be accepted was agreed unanimously.

Election to fill a Casual Vacancy on the Deanery Synod until 2017

The vacancy had arisen because the Synod had changed the day on which it met and Mr Turnbull was unable to attend. No one had been nominated to fill the vacancy, which therefore remained.

Election of five Members of the Parochial Church Council to serve until 2019 and one Member to serve until 2017.

One member had come to the end of his period of office, two vacancies had come about through resignations and three had existed for some time.

Five nominations for membership had been received:

- Mrs E Whitehead (proposed by Mr J Roberts and seconded by Mr E Bezant);
- Mr A Harford (proposed by Mr G Barley and seconded by Mr C Perry);
- Mr C Turnbull (proposed by Mr R Jackson and seconded by Mr G Barley);
- Mr P Aspinall (proposed by Mr J Roberts and seconded by Mrs J Dean);

Mrs D Aspinall (proposed by Mr J Roberts and seconded by Mrs J Dean).

They were duly elected.

Appointment of Sidespersons

The Rector read out the list of names of current sidespersons, saying that more were required for St Chad's. They were all reappointed nem con.

Other Business

The Rector informed the meeting that Mrs Joyce Ratcliffe had retired as verger, where she had assisted at weddings, funerals and other services. A gift of flowers had been purchased and would be taken to her after the meeting.

Rector's Closing Remarks

The Rector thanked the PCC and the Standing Committee for their support, and also thanked the retired members of the clergy and others who had officiated in her absence during her sabbatical.

Closing Remarks by the Churchwardens

Mr Roberts said he had enjoyed his experience as churchwarden, and thanked everyone who had supported him, particularly the Rector who gave 100% of her energy and ability. He thanked Mr Perry and Mr Barley. Having been treasurer for two years while also churchwarden, he understood the complexity of the role and the pressures that could arise and thanked Mr Williams for his work.

The meeting closed at 6.58 pm and was followed by a service of Compline.

The Electoral Roll

All Church of England parishes are required to maintain an electoral roll. Those people whose names are on the roll are entitled to attend the Annual Parish Meeting and to vote. They are also eligible for election on to the Parochial Church Council. The number of people on the electoral roll also determines how many representatives can be sent to the Deanery Synod where decisions may be taken that effect the churches within the deanery. It is therefore important that all those eligible should be entered on to electoral roll for this parish of St Bartholomew Thurstaston and St Chad Irby. Although the roll may be updated regularly a new roll has to be created every 6 years and 2013 was the most recent year in which this had to be done.

To be eligible applicants must be 16 years of age or over and Either Live within the parish boundary or Or Have been a regular worshipper at St Bartholomew Thurstaston or St Chad Irby for at least 6 months.

Women's World Day of Prayer 3rd March – Philippines

On Friday 3rd March over 5,000 services will be held in the British Isles on the theme of 'Am I Being Unfair to You?' The Christian women of the Philippines wrote the service and it has been translated into 1,000 different languages and dialects, to be used, throughout the whole world, on that day, starting at sunrise over the island of Samoa and continuing until sunset off the coast of American Samoa.

In 2013, Typhoon Haiyan – named locally as 'Yolanda' – struck the Philippine islands in the western Pacific Ocean. This is mentioned in the service but you will also hear the stories of a girl, a mother and an older woman, recounting their situations and their hopes and fears.



MOVIE Nick and Carol Pollard from EthosMedia.org share thought-provoking reflections on the latest films.

Trolls is a gloriously happy, family film, with a sing-along soundtrack. But there are also hidden depths to the storyline. And these can help children question the playground assumption that we make ourselves happy by pushing others down.



The Trolls are delightful, colourful, happy creatures. But their lives are threatened by the Bergens who believe they can absorb the Troll's happiness by eating them. In fact, the Bergens are convinced that the only way to be happy is through taking the happiness of a Troll.

The Trolls have found a safe hiding place to live, but when Poppy, the happiest Troll ever, throws an enormous fireworks party, their location is revealed, and the Bergen's Troll-catcher takes some of them prisoner. So, Poppy sets out on a daring rescue

mission, armed only with happiness and songs. Through her sacrificial actions the Bergens discover that they don't need to take another's happiness, because it is already inside all of us, we just need someone to help us find it.

This is a fun-filled family film. But it can also spark a conversation about what it means to be happy, and whether this must be at the expense of others. Is life really a 'zero-sum game' in which one person's gain depends upon another person's loss? *Trolls* provides an opportunity to help our children consider what it really means to 'find your happy place', and maybe reflect on the words of Jesus who said: 'If anyone wants to be first, he must be the very last, and the servant of all.'
