What do you smell like at work?

This does not mean when you're a bit sweaty from your cycle ride to the office, or after you've polished off a cheese and onion salad sandwich for lunch.

It does means what do you exude when you go to meetings? When you meet clients or patients, when you work closely on a project with colleagues, when you chat with your boss... what do people breathe in when they're around you?

2 Corinthians 2 talks about us being the 'aroma of Christ' to people – that as we interact with those around us, over time, our words and our actions develop a scent and a flavour that can suggest something of God's character.

Fiona, a social services manager from Scotland, seems to smell pretty good. "I look at you and I wonder how you can behave as you do", a colleague said to her recently as they battled for the umpteenth time with a long-running and very difficult service complaint. "You're under so much stress and always busy, but you always have a smile and a different perspective."

Tom, who heads up a car-company sales team in the Midlands, also has something of a godly scent – despite the competitive industry he's in, where the temptation to cover up mistakes is high. One of his managers recently commented: "I really respect that you always tell the truth and don't try to hide problems – that's had a huge impact on me, and on the team too"

All of us can approach our work in a way that gives off a Christ-like aroma. The scent comes from the ripening fruits of the Spirit in our lives: love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.



A knock on the door reminded me I must get round to fixing that bell! The words, 'That will be £6 please, sir,' were my first indication that we had our own window cleaner. My extremely rare forays into the world of water and chamois leather were, mercifully, at an end!

The experience set me thinking about windows and the properties of glass. I remember, as a child, being somewhat mystified by the question, 'Is your father a glazier?' whenever I stood in someone's way – especially because everyone knew he was a steelfixer and bar bender! He, in turn, was incensed by one of the few items of history he had acquired during his short school career that, in the past, people had felt it necessary to brick up windows because of the iniquitous 'Window Tax' – a tax on daylight!

However, all is not gloom - for glass and its properties have been used as



powerful Christian symbols by many writers. Paul, in his wonderful passage in 1 Corinthians 13 about the gift of love, looking forward to that, 'which is perfect to come,'

explains, 'For now we see through a glass darkly, but then face to face. Now I know in part but then shall I know even as also I am known.' Similarly, George Herbert in his hymn, 'Teach me my God and King,' used glass to illustrate the choices we can make in response to God's revelation:

A man may look on glass On it may stay his eye; Or, if he pleaseth, through it pass And then the heaven espy.

I have always been struck by how simple, yet how clear, this analogy is. Of course, had I taken more notice of the fourth verse, I would have realised that even cleaning windows should have been a real joy – if approached in the right frame of mind!

A servant with this clause Makes drudgery divine, Who sweeps a room, as for thy laws. Makes that and the action fine.

People approach the divinity of Christ in many ways. For some, it is expressed in the story of the Virgin Birth or in the miracles or in the Passion and Resurrection. The theologian, Paul Tillich approached it from, seemingly, the other end of the scale. For him, it was Jesus' total humility, selflessness and openness to God's will that made Him divine. To explain this, he used the symbolism of transparency. For Tillich, Jesus was so utterly selfless and open to God's will that He became, as it were, transparent, so that God was revealed through Him in a unique, once and for all, way.

Thomas Merton, a 20th century contemplative Christian writer, in his book, 'New Seeds of Contemplation', attempts to set out for us the mystery of Christ using the imagery of the magnifying glass:

As a magnifying glass concentrates the rays of the sun into a little burning knot of heat that can set fire to a dry leaf or a piece of paper, so the mystery of Christ in the gospel concentrates the rays of God's light and fire to a point that sets fire to the spirit of man. And this is why Christ was born and lived in the world and died and returned from death and ascended to his father in heaven. Through the glass of His incarnation, He concentrates the rays of His Divine Truth and Love upon us so that we feel the burn, and all mystical experience is communicated to men through the Man Christ.

It would appear from these passages that, not only can glass illuminate our everyday lives, but it may



also act as a symbol that can illuminate our spiritual lives. As for me, perhaps it's time I got around to having a look at that bell, now that our new window cleaner has freed up some of my time!

NORTH WEST GOSPEL CONCERT MEMORIES

THE CROSSBEATS



Based at St. Leonard, Bootle, this five -man Christian beat group had been OSSBEATS in public demand for a while. In 1967, their LP (Yes! Good "old" vinyl) **CRAZY MIXED-UP GENERATION was** right on young peoples' wavelength with its direct Christian message.

In March '69 they played in the old church hall of St Mark New Ferry, to that Church's YPF and their guests. The attendance figure was 153 reminding us of the number of fish netted by Simon Peter and his companions on the morning that the risen Jesus had told them where to cast their net (JOHN, Chapter 21). It is quite salutary, to recall alongside, Jesus' parable involving fish in MATTHEW 13.47-50.

GLORYLANDERS



This was a three-piece Christian folk band based near Oldham, at South Chadderton Methodist church, which had a thriving youth group. Very like the four-piece Australian group The Seekers, having guitars and an enormous bass, they

made last minute arrangements in March '72 to play at Chadderton Town Hall, having cancelled a trip to Ireland because of the troubles there. With 300+ people in attendance, including the Chairman of the Council and his lady, they rounded off their one and a half hour concert with Isaac Watts' hymn WHEN I SURVEY THE WONDROUS CROSS ON WHICH THE PRINCE OF GLORY DIED, MY RICHEST GAIN I

COUNT BUT LOSS, AND POUR CONTEMPT ON ALL MY PRIDE, sung to the tune adapted by Cecil Sharp from the melody of an old Scottish song, "The Water is Wide", which the Australian Seekers had recorded in 1964. The tune can be found in both the present hymn books we use, and was also in YOUTH PRAISE 2 which was launched in 1969 by Michael Baughen and team. Having come to the last two lines of Watts' great hymn,

"Love so amazing so Divine Demands my soul, my life, my all."

the GLORYLANDERS' lead singer, Arthur Pemberton added "Love so amazing so Divine SHALL HAVE my soul, my life, my all."

PARCHMENT



In December 1972, this 3-piece band sang their own composition LIGHT UP THE FIRE, at the Renold Theatre, UMIST, Manchester. This emblematically titled song became the theme song of the Festivals of Jesus.

It was Liverpudlian Sue McClellan who led the band in singing the song, which actually reached

number 31 in the old official British Singles Chart. It had entered the chart at 34 in September after only two weeks from release. Radio Luxembourg had played it extensively, but the BBC chickened

out and one DJ vowed he would not play it, even if it hit the number one spot.

However, it is still sung in Christian circles and is still a favourite in school assemblies. So -

"TELL THE PEOPLE OF JESUS,....."
