




From Your Rector

Dear Friends

A Plastic Revolution

The recent Blue Planet II series exposed just how much plastic waste is an issue in our seas. The Prime Minister has called plastic waste '*one of the great environmental scourges of our time.*' The best estimates suggest 10 million tonnes of plastic ends up in our oceans, contaminating and killing sea life. How should we view this issue from a Christian perspective?



When God created the universe, He saw '*everything He had made, and indeed, it was very good.*' (Genesis 1:31). He calls us to share in His care of creation: '*Be fruitful and increase in number; fill the earth and subdue it. Rule over the fish in the sea and the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves on the ground.*' (Genesis 1:28). Our *rule* over living creatures is not an excuse to exploit them in a selfish way. As those who made in the image of God, we are entrusted to care for them with responsibility and trustworthiness.

Why do the sea creatures being killed by plastic matter? Because of human rebellion against God (see Genesis 3), our relationship with God and His creation was damaged. No longer do we live with living creatures in harmony and interdependence. Yet after the flood, when Noah rescued the animals in the ark, they are included in God's everlasting promise to protect the earth: '*I now establish my covenant with you and with your descendants after you, and with every living creature that was with you.'* (Genesis 9:9,10). This also points to God's cosmic plan to restore all creation to Himself.

What is our response to be? Where is God calling us, as His people in this time and place, to make a stand in protecting His creation? Time for a plastic revolution?

Parish Walk - Sat 18th August All Timings (apart from start!) are approximate Approximately 6-7 miles (not measured using any technical devices!)

Can't do all day or can't walk far: then come to whatever parts of the day you can manage - Lunch, Pause for Thought at St Bartholomew's, just the morning (approx 9.00-11.30) or afternoon (approx 12.30-3.00)

8.45am Meet at St Chad's 9.00am Set off

(1) Turn left out of the car park. At the top of Roslin Rd, turn right, walk through the shops, crossing at the pedestrian lights. At the end of the road turn left. Turn left into Woodlands Rd. At the bottom of the road turn left onto the footpath across two fields (there may be cattle in these fields). At the far side turn right through kissing gate, down steps and over stream. Turn left and follow footpath through Harrock Wood until you reach Thingwall Rd. Cross over, turn right and then left to the entrance of Limbo Lane. (2)

9.20-9.30am Pause for Thought - Health Care

Follow Limbo Lane straight on until you come out at Arrowe Brook Lane. Turn left and proceed in single file along the grass verge (for about 5 minutes) —TAKE CARE. At the roundabout turn left into Mill Hill Road and cross over onto the pavement. Turn left into Sandy Lane North (3)

10.05-10.15am Sandy Lane North - Wait while everyone catches up

Follow the lane as it bends left and then right. As you run out of lane ("Hazledene" on your left), proceed down the footpath (narrow and nettles etc.). At the bottom, cross the bridge and head up the hill ahead of you. Follow the wall on your right. At the far end, continue in a straight line through the woods to reach the corner of Royden Park main field. Follow the wall to the far corner of the field. Turn left up the main path and follow this in a straight line, go through the kissing gate and past Benty Farm. Then take the fork in the path to the right which will bring you to the top of School Lane. (4)

10.50-11.00am Pause for thought - Education

Follow the path along behind Dawpool school (or go up and over the hill) to reach Telegraph Rd. Turn left and walk to the Cottage Loaf Roundabout. If you just want to walk in the morning you could return to St Chad's from here. Turn right down Station Road taking care as there is no pavement. Follow this road all the way down to the Country Park. (5)

11.45 -12.45pm Picnic Lunch (or visit the Café)

If you just want to walk in the afternoon, you could join us during lunch. Turn onto the Wirral Way (Heswall direction) and follow it under the Dungeon Bridge and then turn left on the footpath signed to the Dungeon. Follow this path (narrow and brambly in places) slightly uphill to the Dungeon (waiting in the opening before crossing the bridge over the stream) (6)

1.15-1.25 Pause for Thought - Farming and Agriculture

Carry on up the steep hill, turning right following the stream, until you reach a T junction in the paths. Turn left and follow this path to St Bartholomew's (7) If you joined us at lunch, you will now need to return down Station Road to you car.


2.00-2.15pm Pause for Thought at St Bartholomew's

On leaving Church head up Church Lane (past Church Farm) to reach Telegraph Rd. Turn left to the roundabout. Turn right onto Thurstaston Rd. Turn almost immediately right onto footpath to Irby. Follow this to Dawlish Rd. Turn right and onto footpath which heads left across field to bring you out on Irby Rd. Return to St Chad's

3.00pm Arrive back at St Chad's

Church of England brings prayers to millions with Alexa

The Church of England is launching an Alexa skill, enabling users to ask the Church of England for prayers, explanations of the Christian faith and where to find their nearest church for local events and services based on their location.



Daily prayer resources are central to the skill, offering a prayer for the day, as well as morning, evening and night-time prayers and a grace before meals all recorded for Alexa devices.

The skill is also integrated with "A Church Near You", our national church finder that gets 13 million page views a year, to find the nearest services and events, and seeks to increase users' knowledge of the Christian faith by answering questions such as: what is the Bible? Who is God? What is a Christian?

The Archbishop of York, Dr John Sentamu, who is featured in a video to promote the Alexa skill, said: "We're thrilled to be launching the Alexa skill today, to enable regular churchgoers and those exploring faith to connect with God in another way at a time that's right for them. A quarter of UK households now own a smart device and, after transforming the Church of England's and Archbishops' national websites last year, this fast-growing area was identified as a priority for development.

"More broadly, this work is part of our wider Renewal and Reform programme, which seeks to ensure the Church of England is a growing Church for all people and in all places."

Adrian Harris, Head of Digital at the Church of England, said: "Platforms such as Alexa give the Church the ability to connect people with God and to weave faith into daily lives, whether for daily prayers or exploring Christianity. We also see this as a fantastic opportunity to encourage people into their local church, which is why the link to A Church Near You is so important, particularly at key moments in the Christian year such as Easter and Christmas.

"We're prioritising Alexa at this stage to reach as many people as quickly as possible, but plan to launch on Google and Apple devices in due course. The recent Church of England Digital Labs event highlighted the importance of voice as a major area of focus and the insights from this day were really useful."

Thomas Allain Chapman, Publishing Manager at the Church of England, said: "The Alexa skill means prayers that Church House Publishing has previously made available in books, apps and e-books will now be available in audio to a new audience in many homes."

This is phase one of the AI project, built jointly by the Church's Digital and Church House Publishing teams, with future development planned to ensure users can find more answers to faith questions.

Users must activate the Church of England skill by saying "Alexa, open the Church of England". A full list of commands is available on our dedicated Alexa page.

One million people go to a Church of England church and more than four million attend at Christmas. The integration with A Church Near You will mean even more users are able to find a local place to worship at key events.



God is able to use us to meet others' needs

We are all familiar with the story of the Feeding of the 5000 (Matthew 14:13-21). It reminds us that *God is able* to use us in meeting the needs of others. As Jesus says to the disciples: *'you give them something to eat* '(16).

We need to share God's compassion:

Jesus responded to need, by showing *'compassion'* (lit: gut reaction, v14) on the crowds. This isn't simply feeling sorry for others, but being ready to act on



their behalf. It's being prepared to enter into their experience and see them as God sees them. You cannot demonstrate compassion at a distance!

We need to share God's heart:

It is said that '*The buck stops here*'! God wants us to take responsibility for those in need. The disciples tried to pass the buck, telling Jesus to '*send the crowds away*' (15). Are we looking for God-given opportunities in church, work or our communities to demonstrate God's love to those who cross our path? It will be costly, involving our time, energy and money eg listening to a colleague, shopping for a neighbour or visiting a friend in hospital.

We need to share what we have:

This story reminds us of the challenges of meeting peoples' needs! The disciples only had five loaves and two fish to feed 5000+ people! It is not simply a matter of what we have, but what God can do with it. They offered what they had to Jesus and He multiplied it to feed the people, leaving 12 basketfuls of leftovers. Are we prepared to let God use what we have: our words, prayer and acts of love?

'Helping one person might not change the world, but it could change the world for that one person.'



Open PCC Meeting with Archdeacon Mike to look at Setting God's People Free 7.30pm Monday 2nd July St Chads Extension EVERYONE Welcome

Setting God's People Free is a national initiative by the Church of England to encourage whole-life discipleship, so that members of our congregations are better equipped to live out their Christian calling Monday to Saturday as well as Sunday. It is about helping people to live intentionally as Christians in the workplace, the home and the neighbourhood. Our parish has been chosen to take part in a Diocesan Pilot related to this initiative. The aim of the pilot will be to assess how well congregations feel they are currently equipped in this area, and how confident they feel about it, and to trial different approaches and resources with them. The learning from the pilot exercise will then feed into a major launch of Setting God's People free in the diocese early in 2019.

Diocesan Strategy for Mission Important Discussion Meeting Thursday July 19th 7.30-9.00pm at St Michael's Pensby.

In recent months there has been some debate in the diocese about how the diocese is best able to meet the missional challenge that we now face. Bishop Peter has written a discussion paper and would like to know what members of local churches think on the issues he raises (including Review of Deaneries, Diocesan Organisation, Ministry among younger people, Buildings and Human Resources). This is going to be done through deaneries. Our deanery meeting will be an open to anyone in the deanery who would like to express a view or be part of the discussion. The Church of England is facing a serious shortage – of church organists



Be very, very nice to your church organist, and don't upset them, because they are becoming somewhat of an endangered species in the Church of England.

In fact, so many churches now have organs, but no organists, that nearly one in three churches have introduced recorded organ music for their congregations to sing along to.

A recent survey found something very ominous: that less than four per cent of churches have organists aged 30 years old or under. Almost half of all churches who do have organists report that they are older than 70.

But recorded organ music is hardly ideal – it tends not to leave enough time between lines, and so rushes the singing along. Also, there is a weaker sense of togetherness and community, if you are singing along to a machine, rather than a person well known to you.

Why so much stress in our schools?

School closes this month. And maybe that's not a moment too soon for many children and their teachers, who are suffering increasing levels of stress and anxiety in school.

For children as young as four are showing signs of mental health problems, with increasing anxiety, panic attacks and depression being presented.

In a poll carried out by the National Association of Schoolmasters Union of Women Teachers (NASUWT) teachers reported rising levels of anxiety, panic, depression, self-harming, eating disorders and signs of obsessive compulsive behaviour among the children. Sexual harassment is also known to be going on in many schools, with children sharing messages, photos and videos of a sexual nature.

Chris Keates, general secretary of NASUWT, said 'Teachers have never before had to deal with such a complex range of pupil welfare issues as they do today. The pressure on teachers and head teachers is enormous. It is putting at risk their own mental and physical health and well-being.'



'He gave us eyes to see them' Ludolph Bakhuizen's 'Christ in the storm on the sea of Galilee'

When we enter a church and sit in a pew, we can look up and see the roof of the nave: a reminder that the church is a ship sailing through the ocean of life. Boats and ships abound in scripture from Noah's ark and the psalmist singing of seafarers to the New Testament with Jesus calling fishermen from their boats and Paul shipwrecked off the coast of Malta. The ship, like the anchor, is a powerful nautical symbol of the Christian journey.

We all know how the sea can be calm and serene one moment, but stormy and tempestuous the next. This month's painting captures the terror of that primal element: 'Christ in the storm on the sea of Galilee' by Ludolph Bakhuizen. He was a leading Dutch painter of maritime subjects in the 17th century with powerful studies of the drama of sea battles and whaling scenes.

Here in this painting of 1695 a boat carrying the anxious disciples is trying to make its way through an angry sea. The waves are high, rain and dark clouds

threaten overhead. and the wind is tearing rigging. the Storms like that quickly sprang up on the sea of Galilee. But Jesus is there among the disciples, ready to allay their fear and ready to tame the elements around. We can see the rays of sunlight on the left of the canvas that will soon through break to



bring peace again beneath a blue sky.

And we on land sitting in that pew can think of those times when life is stormy and the way ahead unsure. We can take heart from the assurance that Jesus is our captain on the voyage, the sails of our ship are hoisted on the mast of His cross, and the destination is certain. Just as Jesus protected His followers then, we pray that He will be with us on our journeys through calm waters and storms, so that we can raise 'glad hymns of praise from land and sea.'

God invented the Sabbath because we needed it. Enjoy your holy-days, wherever or whatever they are.


It is easy to understand the popularity of Mary Magdalene over the centuries: she is the patron saint of repentant sinners, and so represents all of us. We honour her on the 22nd of July.

Jesus drove seven demons from Mary, who came from near Tiberius in Galilee. Mary is thought to have been the woman who anointed Christ's feet in the house of Simon (Luke 7:37. She certainly followed Jesus to the bitter end – from Galilee to Jerusalem. Mary was present during the crucifixion, standing heart-broken at the foot of the cross. Her love for Jesus did not end there, for she went to the tomb to anoint his body on the Sunday morning.

Such faithful, humble devotion was richly repaid: she was the first person to whom the Risen Lord appeared on Easter Sunday morning. She thought He was the gardener at first.

Mary Magdalene's feast has been kept in the West since the 8th century. England has 187 ancient churches dedicated to her, as well as a College in both Oxford and Cambridge.
