



From your rector

Dear Friends,

Lent is seen by many as a time for giving things up, but I want to encourage you instead to think of it as a time of discovery of God through the desert of discipline, and I'd like to encourage you when in church during Lent to



listen carefully to the wonderfully positive picture of Lent which is painted by the Eucharistic prayer.

It begins as we would expect it to, by reminding us to give thanks and praise to Almighty God through Jesus his son. Then begins the reminder of what Lent is about. "For in these forty days" - A period of 6 weeks before Easter when we prepare ourselves spiritually to celebrate the resurrection and the living Christ. "In these forty days you lead us into the desert of repentance that through a pilgrimage of prayer and discipline we may grow in grace and learn to be your people once again." Let's take a look at that sentence, and examine what it means for us:-

The desert of repentance doesn't sound like a nice place to be! Deserts are dry arid places, with very little if any refreshment. No-one with any sense would enter into a desert without the right preparation or an experienced guide to lead them.

Our pilgrimage through Lent is not a physical one, but a spiritual one. It is a pilgrimage of prayer and discipline. For many, this is even harder than a physical journey, and one which they choose not to enter into.

The end of this sentence is where it begins to get really positive. God leads us on a pilgrimage of discipline into the desert of repentance IN ORDER THAT we may grow in grace and learn to be his people once again. Growing in grace is a wonderful thing,

because we discover more and more of the love which God has for us shown through Jesus death on the cross and all that that means.

Lent allows us annually to reflect on our own relationship with God and provides a time for us to learn to be his people once again.

Learning to be his people, involves fasting, praying and acts of service, which in turn means that our eyes become open to God's presence in the world. What spiritual pilgrimage are you going to make this Lent? When will you fast? When will you pray? What acts of service will you carry out?

Lent is not a negative time of giving things up, but an exciting opportunity in which we are invited to participate. It may not be an easy journey, but the blessings and the joy will far outweigh any temporary hardship.

Father, as we fast and pray and carry out acts of service this Lent, may our eyes be opened to your presence in the world and may we grow in grace. Amen.

Wishing you every blessing on your spiritual pilgrimage.

MEETING OF PARISHIONERS AND ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING

The Annual Church Meetings will be held on Sunday 27 March 2011 at 6:00 pm in St Chad's. It is an opportunity for all parishioners to contribute to and be involved in the affairs of the Parish. Please come and give your support. The meeting will be followed by a short service for those who wish to stay.

We shall receive reports on the matters discussed by the Parochial Church Council, the financial affairs of the Church, the Deanery Synod and the associated Organisations. We shall also:

- discuss the independently inspected accounts of the PCC for the year ended 31 December 2010
- elect Church Wardens, who must be nominated and seconded in writing before the meeting (Churchwarden's Measure 2001)
- elect representatives to the Deanery Synod
- elect members of the Parochial Church Council
- appoint Sidespersons for the year
- receive a report on the Electoral Roll
- discuss any topics raised by parishioners.

Sidespersons' names are displayed in the churches on the duty rotas. If you wish to bring any topics forward for discussion, please notify the Rector or Secretary in advance of the meeting.

The Parochial Church Council currently comprises the Rector (Revd J Turner), the Churchwardens (Mr R Jackson and Mr J Roberts), the representatives to the Deanery Synod (Mr M Studholme, Dr E Norton-Jones and Mr C Smale, with one vacancy), all as *ex- officio* members, Mrs J Abbott and Mr C Eden, co-opted in 2010, and the following twelve elected representatives of the congregation:

Mr A Whelen, Mr E Jones, Mr G Barley, Mr E Bezant and Mr C Vickers, elected until 2011

- Mr J Oliver, Mr D Wolstencroft and Mrs J DeBoorder, elected until 2012
- Mrs K Robson, Dr M James, Mrs S Lang and Mrs E Jones, elected until 2013.

Mr A Whelen, Mr E Jones, Mr G Barley, Mr E Bezant and Mr C Vickers retire from office this year but may be re-elected for a further three years. The terms of office of the Deanery Synod Representatives' also end this year: they can be re-elected and there is a vacancy.

In addition to the four Deanery Synod positions, eight people can be elected to the PCC, five until 2014, one until 2013 and two until 2012. Five current elected members are available for re-election. The two co-opted members, Mrs Abbott and Mr Eden, may be elected.

Nominations for churchwardens must be received in writing in the proper form by the Rector before the meeting and may not be made after the meeting has begun.

Lists for nominations of Wardens, Sidespersons and members of the Council will be posted at the two churches. Please enter the names of nominees and sponsors. Any other members wishing to retire are asked to inform the Secretary well before the meeting.

ANNUAL CHURCH MEETINGS SUNDAY 18TH APRIL 2010 AT 6.00 PM AT ST CHAD'S

The Rector opened the meeting with a prayer. The minutes of both meetings (2009) had been published in the April edition of the parish magazine, "Crosstalk".

Apologies for Absence

Apologies were received from Mr G Barley, Mrs L Barley, Dr M James, Mrs D Jeffrey, Mrs E Jones, Mrs S Lang, Mrs C Samson, Mr P Samson, Mrs B Rimmer, Mr F Rimmer and Mrs S Smale.

ANNUAL MEETING OF PARISHIONERS Approval of Minutes of Previous Meeting (26th April 2009)

A proposal made and seconded by Dr P Robson and Mrs M McKie that the minutes were a true and accurate record of the meeting was agreed unanimously.

Election of Churchwardens

Mr R Jackson and Mr J Roberts had been nominated and seconded, and had signed to say they agreed to the nomination and were not disqualified. As no further nominations had been received prior to the meeting, Mr Jackson and Mr Roberts were declared elected.

The Rector thanked Mr G Burns, the retiring warden, for his work during his period of office and especially since her induction. She presented him with a gift and also thanked Mrs Burns for her support and work throughout Mr Burns' time as warden. Mr Burns thanked the Rector and the congregations.

ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING

Approval of Minutes of Previous Meeting (26th April 2009)

Mrs B Appleyard proposed that the minutes be accepted as a true and accurate record of the meeting, subject to one correction: that Mr B Appleyard be changed to Mrs B Appleyard (first paragraph on page 12 of "Crosstalk". Mrs L Ormsby seconded the proposal, which was agreed unanimously.

Report on the Fabric, Goods and Ornaments of the Churches

Mr G Burns and Mr R Jackson, churchwardens, presented their reports, which were accepted by the meeting with no questions.

Report on the Business of the Council and Other Church Activities in 2009

Mr G Barley, Honorary Secretary to the PCC, was unable to attend the meeting, but had asked the Rector to draw parishioners' attention to his report published in the St Bartholomew's and St Chad's Annual Report for 2009. There were no questions about the report.

Report on the Financial Affairs of the Parish during 2009 and Approval of the Annual Accounts

Mr C Eden, Honorary Treasurer to the PCC, presented his report and the annual account. He explained the difference between Restricted, Unrestricted and Endowment Funds and drew parishioners' attention to the closing balance of £18,096 in Unrestricted Funds, compared to £24,400 the previous year, warning that this figure could not be allowed to fall further or the parish would face a significant cashflow problem. In response to a question, he acknowledged that there had been an improvement in the parish's financial situation since the Giving Initiative in July-September 2009 and hoped that this would continue. He replied to a second question by explaining that by no means all members of the Planned Giving Envelope Scheme made up their giving if they missed a service, and he therefore urged parishioners to consider taking out a Standing Order.

The Rector thanked Mr Eden for all his hard work over the past year.

Report on the Proceedings of the Deanery Synod

In response to a question about the possible reorganisation of Wirral deaneries, Mr M Studholme said that the matter appeared to have been shelved. Mr C Smale added that certain pastoral issues within the Wallasey deanery were currently being addressed, but that there was no guarantee that Bishop Peter would not put reorganisation back on the agenda at some future date.

Report on the Electoral Roll

Mr J Roberts, the Electoral Roll Officer, reported that, in revising the roll, he had removed the names of eighteen people who had died or moved away from the parish, but had added twelve new names. Following this revision the number currently on the Roll stood at 283.

Report on the Sunday School

Mrs J DeBoorder referred to the Sunday School section of the published Annual Report.

Report on the St Chad's Seniors

Mrs K Robson referred to the Seniors' section of the published Annual Report.

Report on the Mothers' Union and EMU

The Annual Report included sections on MU and EMU. Mrs S Burns thanked members for their continuing support.

Other Reports

In response to a question, it was admitted that part of the Playgroup report had accidentally been omitted from the published Annual Report. The Rector promised that the missing section would be retrieved and the full report published in "Crosstalk".

Mr P Robson expressed his appreciation to Dr M James for organising the men's breakfast meetings and invited others to join the group. The Rector reported that the Rainbows were about to go into new leadership. Mrs P Wonder-

ley's retirement, after approximately 16 years as leader, would be marked in the July 2010 Family Service. She said that the Brownies were flourishing and that there was a full Guide company, with some families coming to church as a direct consequence.

A question was asked about the possibility of having the "special" choir two or three times a year at St Bartholomew's, not just at Christmas. The Rector said she would discuss this matter with the PCC.

The Rector expressed her recognition of the fact that so much is going on within the Parish and her appreciation to the co-ordinators of all these Church and Church- affiliated groups.

Appointment of an Independent Examiner of the Accounts for 2010

A proposal by Mr J Oliver and seconded by Mr M Studholme that Mr R Turner be asked whether he would agree to be the Independent Examiner again was accepted unanimously.

Election of One Deanery Synod Representative to serve until 2011

There being no volunteer, one vacancy remains.

Election of Five Members of the Parochial Church Council to serve until 2013 and One Member to serve until 2012

Mrs P Brady, Mrs D Jeffrey and Mrs H Rathmell had retired from the PCC. The Rector thanked them and Mr B Appleyard (co-opted youth representative who had also decided to stand down), presenting them with a small gift in recognition of their work and contributions. Mr J Roberts had retired on reaching the end of his period of 9

office, but would continue as an ex officio member of the PCC by virtue of having been elected a churchwarden. Dr M James, Mrs E Jones and Mrs K Robson had also retired on reaching the ends of their periods of office but were eligible for re-election. All three had been nominated and seconded for election, as had two other candidates, one of whom was disqualified from the election because she had not been on the electoral roll for six months, whilst the other had already been elected to the post of churchwarden. The four qualifying candidates, who were duly declared elected, with the names of those who nominated and seconded them in brackets,

Dr M James (Mrs K Robson and Mr C Smale); Mrs E Jones (Mrs P Hulme, Mr A Wallis and Dr E Norton-Jones);

Mrs S Lang (Mr A Wallis and Mrs P Hulme); Mrs K Robson (Dr C James and Mr C Smale).

The Rector proposed that the other candidate, Mrs J Abbott, be co-opted at the next PCC meeting. She also took the opportunity of thanking Mrs C Samson for her work on the social committee.

Appointment of Sidespersons

The list of sidespersons shown in the Annual Report was verified, with the addition of Mrs J Abbott and the clarification (as noted in the minutes of the 2009 meeting) that Miss H Appleyard would carry out the duties of a sidesperson at St Chad's although she was still too young to be legally appointed.

Those appointed were: Mrs J Abbott, Mr E Bezant, Mrs J Bibby, Mr P Bradshaw, Mrs S Burns, Mrs P Cleary, Mrs J Dean, Mrs P Hulme, Mrs S Hunt, Mr A Jones, Mr CW Jones, Mrs D Jones, Mrs E Jones, Mr E Jones, Mr L Kingsbury, Mrs S Lang, Mr A Peat, Mr J Roberts, Mrs L Roberts, Mrs D Turner and Mr A Wallis for St Bartholomew's; and Mr B Appleyard, Miss H Appleyard, Mrs L Barley, Mrs J Hazeldine, Mr S Jeffrey*, Dr E Norton-Jones, Mr J Oliver, Mrs J Ratcliffe, Dr D Reed*, Mrs D Robinson, Mr C Smale, Mr M Smale, Mr A Tempest, Dr C Turnbull and Mr D Wolstencroft for St Chad's.

Other Business

The Rector informed the meeting that she had received notification verbally on Tuesday 13th April and in writing on Saturday 17th April that the Chancellor had granted the faculty relating to the Open Door Project. She expressed her pleasure that it would now be possible to devote maximum energy to achieving completion of the project.

Rector's Closing Remarks

The Rector said that her second year of ministry in the parish had been both active and challenging, but that she wished to extend a huge thank-you to everyone who had supported her during that time.

Churchwarden's Remarks

Mr G Burns, who was retiring as churchwarden, commented on his sense of satisfaction that on this occasion he really could have the last word, saying what a privilege it had been to serve as warden. He thanked everyone who had helped him over the years, expressing particular gratitude to his wife, and handed over his badge of office to his successor. Having remarked on the good-hearted nature of the parish, he conveyed everyone's thanks to the Rector, praising her for her management skills – so necessary in today's

world – as well as for her preaching ability. He felt, he said, a particular sense of satisfaction at the fact that, having been involved in the start of the Open Door Project when he first became warden, he was able to see the completion of this stage before he retired from office. He ended his remarks by quoting a slightly adapted first verse of a Charles Wesley hymn:

Forth in thy name, O Lord, we go,

Our daily labour to pursue.

Thee, only Thee, resolved to know,

In all we think, or speak, or do.

The Rector, having closed the meeting at 6.45 pm, then led a service of Compline.





CHURCH ELECTORAL ROLL - 2011 REVISION

This year the roll will be subject to the usual annual review. Current members will automatically remain on the roll and new members can be added until the end of March.

Members are reminded that to be a member of the role a person's main place of residence must be within the parish or they must be a regular attendee at worship.

Only members of the roll will be entitled to vote at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting, which will be held on 27th March 2010, and be elected to hold office in the parish and/or deanery.

Four years ago in 2007 the previous roll, which had been in force since 2002, was closed and a new roll compiled in accordance with the Church Representation Rules. Not everyone who was a member of the earlier roll joined the new roll at that time, or during the revision that took place in 2008. We, therefore, encourage everyone who wishes to be a member to view the current roll which will be displayed at both churches throughout March. If you are not listed as a member we invite you to complete an application form.

We also ask existing members to check their entry, correct any errors and/or update their address.

The roll is the official record of all those who are members of our churches and reflects the depth and strength of our parish. Anyone aged 16 years or older who is baptized and is a member of the Church of England, (or a church in communion with the Church of England) and lives within the parish boundary, or lives outside the parish boundary but is a habitual attendee at our services is entitled to be a member of the roll. We, therefore, strongly encourage all those who regularly attend our churches to become members of the roll.

Ash Wednesday: 9th March 7.30pm Irby Methodist Church A joint service to mark the beginning of Lent

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday. But why 'Ash' Wednesday? The reason has to do with getting things right between you and God, and the tradition goes right back to the Old Testament.

In the Old Testament, the Israelites often sinned. When they finally came to their senses, and saw their evil ways as God saw them, they could do nothing but repent in sorrow. They mourned for the damage and evil they had done. As part of this repentance, they covered their heads with ashes. For the Israelites, putting ashes on your head, and even rending your clothes, was an outward sign of their heart-felt repentance and acknowledgement of sin. (See Genesis 18:27; 2 Samuel 13:19; Job 2:8, 30:19; Isaiah 58:5; Jeremiah 6:26; Jonah 3:6)


In the very early Christian Church, the yearly 'class' of penitents had ashes sprinkled over them at the beginning of Lent. They were turning to God for the first time, and mourning their sins. But soon many other Christians wanted to take part in the custom, and to do so at the very start of Lent. They heeded Joel's call to 'rend your hearts and not your garments' (Joel 2:12-19). Ash Wednesday became known as either the 'beginning of the fast' or 'the day of the ashes'.

The collect for today goes back to the Prayer Book, and stresses the penitential character of the day. It encourages us with the reminder of the readiness of God to forgive us and to renew us.

The Bible readings for today are often Joel 2:1-2, 12-18, Matthew 6: 1-6, 16-21 and Paul's moving catalogue of suffering, "as having nothing and yet possessing everything." (2 Corinthians 5:20b - 6:10)

The actual custom of 'ashing' was abolished at the Reformation, though the old name for the day remained. Today, throughout the Church of England, receiving the mark of ashes on one's forehead is optional. Certainly the mark of ashes on the forehead reminds people of their mortality: "Remember that you are dust and to dust you will return..." (Genesis 3:19)

The late medieval custom was to burn the branches used on Palm Sunday in the previous year in order to create the ashes for today. The Collect for Ash Wednesday is:



Almighty and everlasting God,
You hate nothing that you have made
and forgive the sins of all those who are penitent:
Create and make in us new and contrite hearts
that we, worthily lamenting our sins
and acknowledging our wretchedness,
may receive from you, the God of all mercy,
perfect remission and forgiveness;
through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord,
who is alive and reigns with you,
in the unity of the Holy Spirit,
one God, now and for ever.

God Bless Sue Burns

The 2nd March is St. Chad's (d 672) Day

Chad should be the patron saint of any modern bishop whose consecration is questioned by another bishop. Chad was consecrated a bishop, then deposed - and then re-consecrated!


It all began when Oswiu, king of Northumbria, made him bishop of the Northumbrian see. But due to a scarcity of appropriate bishops, two dubious bishops did the job of consecrating him. This led to Theodore, Archbishop of Canterbury, deciding to depose him about three years later.

Chad took his dismissal with good heart, and peacefully retired. But then Theodore had second thoughts: Chad was of excellent character: humble, devout, and zealous. So Theodore re-consecrated him – to be the first bishop of the Mercians. Second time around, Chad was a great success - again.

When Chad died he was quickly venerated as a saint. People took a great fancy to his bones, believing that they would bring healing. Even today, four large bones, dating from the 7th century, and believed to be Chad's, are in the R.C. cathedral in Birmingham.

Bishops today may still argue about consecration, but they are unlikely to have their bones disturbed.

Women's World Day of Prayer 7.30pm St Chad's Friday 4th March

This month - on the first Friday in March - women in our local churches will join with millions of others around the world with one aim in mind - to pray. The Women's World Day of Prayer has in recent years become a global, ecumenical movement of informed prayer and prayerful action, organised and led by Christian women.

The service is written by a different country each year and that country then becomes the focus of the world's prayers on the day itself. It begins as dawn breaks over the islands of Tonga in the Pacific and continues across each continent until the last services of this special day are held back in the Pacific, on the islands of Samoa, circling the world in prayer for 36 hours.

By then the day will have been celebrated in over 170 countries and over 5,000 services will have been held in England, Wales and Northern Ireland.

The origins of Women's World Day of Prayer date back to the late nineteenth century when Christian women in the USA and Canada began a variety of activities in support of women's involvement in mission, at home and abroad. But it was not until the 1930s that Women's World Day of Prayer services began in Britain.

This year 2011 the worship material has been prepared by the women of Chile. Its theme, 'How many loaves have you?', is appropriate as bread is eaten at every meal in Chile, and is very much part of everyday life.

Although organised and led by women, this is essentially a day of prayer for everybody, as Christians demonstrate their solidarity with 'sisters and brothers' in other countries. So - all are welcome to attend!

March Recipe - Almond Tray Bake

Line a Swiss roll tin with 225gm (8oz) shortcrust pastry. Spread with raspberry jam.

INGREDIENTS

115gm (4oz) marg

115gm (4oz) sugar

2 eggs beaten

115qm (4oz) ground almonds

55gm (2oz) ground rice or semolina

85gm (3oz) sultanas

85gm (3oz) glace cherries

2-3 drops almond essence

Method

Grease and line a Swiss roll tin with pastry, make sure it comes well up the sides of the tin.

Spread jam on pastry.

Mix all the ingredients well and spread on top of the jam and pastry.

If you have a few flaked almonds these can be sprinkled on top.

Bake for 40 mins at Gas Mk 4/180C/350F until pastry and filling are brown and crisp. Allow to cool in tin before cuttig into squares.

I have used this recipe as a cake or warm as a pudding.


